Traffic, Parking, Fences and Other Ugly Things

Topics at neighborhood association officer meetings can be far-ranging, but they usually come back to the same basic topics that affect the quality of life where we live: security, convenience and a sense of community. "Quality of life" sounds insubstantial until you start talking about specifics, like trees, traffic, parking, fences and welcoming neighbors. Then it's very tangible and very personal. When a neighbor starts parking vehicles on the lawn or a leaky car right in front of someone else's house, you'll see how property owners can suddenly be engaged.

Good planning and community involvement shape quality of life. Aksarben Village and the University add enormous vibrancy to our area and their growth directly impacts our neighborhood. Anyone who lived here during horse racing years will tell you that on race days, the traffic was awful and the parking worse. Residents had to have parking stickers to park on the street in front of their own homes.

We need to take a hard look at parking if the ugly fence separating our neighborhood from the campus is removed. The fence was constructed to keep people off the horse track. Now it just serves as a barrier to walkability for our residents and that affects both convenience and community. Chain link fences may be appropriate around prisons but not around campuses or neighborhoods. But simply removing it without having a good plan in place for parking could prove more divisive than the physical fence – pitting residents against students and Village businesses.

Planning can increase the positive impacts and mitigate negative impacts. A representative from the City's Traffic Engineering department will speak at our November meeting.
