Food for Birds in Winter

Birds need our help finding food, shelter and water in the winter.

Most birds that visit backyards in snowy weather thrive on seeds, since insects and fruit are harder to find naturally during the winter. The best foods to offer birds in colder weather have a high fat or oil content that will provide abundant energy for winter survival. Nutritious winter foods for birds include:

Black oil sunflower seedHulled peanutsNiger seedSuet mixes with seeds or fruitPeanut butterWhite millet seed

When choosing birdseed and other foods for winter feeding, take into consideration which bird species are present in the winter and what foods they prefer to avoid excess wasted seed. Many birders also prefer to use no-mess seed mixes such as hulled sunflower seeds in the winter to avoid several months' of hull accumulation beneath feeders in the spring.



More Winter Bird Feeding Tips

Clean off feeders, platforms and perches after each storm so seed is easily accessible.

Leave fruit and berries on trees, hedges and bushes to provide a natural source of food throughout the winter. Add a heated birdbath to your backyard or place a safe heating element in a regular birdbath to provide birds with liquid water.

Stamp or shovel snow around feeders to provide easier access to spilled seed for ground feeding birds.

Leave nesting boxes and birdhouses up all year round to provide winter roosting sites.

With care and consideration, backyard birding can be an exhilarating hobby throughout the winter, with birdsong and backyard visits to brighten the coldest, darkest days of the season.



Gifford Park Neighborhood School/Save Yates Effort -Update By Chris Foster



On behalf of our Gifford Park Neighborhood School/Save Yates effort, THANKS to all of you who have and continue to support our neighborhood vision of encouraging OPS and Creighton to work together so our new elementary school can be built on vacant Creighton parking lot land (that is for sale) near 32nd & Webster St, and save Yates Community Center. The support has been very inspiring – 150+ attended our November 10 communi-

ty meeting at Yates; 12 excellent speakers at 3 OPS board meetings in late October and November; and very positive media coverage! Many thanks to our Neighborhood School/Save Yates Effort leadership team of Leslie Wessel, Eliza Perry, Matt Cronin, Martin Janousek, Chris Foster and Mike Caban.

Regarding the new school, there is nearly \$17 million slated in the OPS facility plan to build our new elementary school. We have been unified since last year about the goals and needs of our neighborhood children and families, and the neighborhood as a whole. We do not want OPS to tear down the existing historic Yates School building at 32nd & Davenport Street, nor tear down existing homes around Yates. Our neighborhood's vision is to see the Yates building continue to serve as public use (as the existing migrant/refugee/pre-K/community center programs do) and even serve more as a community center for ours and surrounding neighborhoods in the future

A few more updates:

-We have been told by OPS and Creighton officials that the two entities are talking, and we will relay to you any updates we receive from official channels as soon as we receive any.

-On December 11, we delivered two packages of nearly 700 support letters, one package to Creighton President Daniel Hendrickson and one package to the Chairman of the Creighton Board of Trustees Mike McCarthy.

-We distributed almost 250 "SAVE YATES" yard signs in and around the Gifford Park neighborhood. OPS officials have told us this timeline for our neighborhood school:

-January 2017 to September 2017 - building design

-October 2017 through December 2017 - construction procurement

-January 2018 through July 2019 - construction

-August 2019 - move in.

OPS plans a thorough process for deciding location and design, our neighborhood will be involved in this process. If you're interested in helping with this effort, you can:

Utility Rate Changes for 2016

When you get your 2016 utility bills in the next few weeks, you're in for a bit of a surprise. In short, your electric (OPPD) bills will increase as will your water bill (MUD), but the natural gas portion of your MUD bill should decrease due to the decreasing cost of natural gas. Starting January 1, 2016, all OPPD residential electricity rates (C/kWh) increased 4.6%, while small commercial (rate 230) electricity rates (C/kWh) increased 2.5%. Then, starting June 1, 2016, residential OPPD service charge (\$/month) will increase from \$10.25/month to \$15/month, while small commercial service charge will increase from \$13/month to \$18/month. Both the residential and small commercial service charges will increase annually on January 1 by \$5/month from 2017 - 2019, topping out at \$30/month residential and \$33/month small commercial. In conjunction with each service charge increase, OPPD says it will decrease electricity rates (C/kWh) approximately 9%, 16%, 22%, and 28% from the January 1, 2016 electricity rates. I say "approximately" because when I asked OPPD for a hard number for their electricity rates on June 1, 2016 when the fix fees change, OPPD would not give me any: "we cannot commit to specific usage rates for the summer and winter because of the number of unknown variables that factor into those calculations".

Starting January 2, 2016, monthly MUD water service charge increased by 3.5% to \$12.96/month (standard 5/8" meter). Likewise, MUD water consumption rate (\$/100 cubic feet of water or CCF) also increased 3.5%, but the water infrastructure cost remained constant (\$4/month). The 3.5% service charge and water usage increase occurred across all sectors (residential, commercial, and industrial). MUD predicts this increase will cost the average residential customer an additional \$10.61/year. MUD also predicts a 2.9% increase per year in water service charge and usage rates in 2017-2020.

Finally some good news, MUD did not increase either the natural gas service charge (\$14/month) or the gas infrastructure replacement cost (\$3/month) for 2016. However, MUD predicts a 2% increase per year in natural gas service charge for 2017-2020. More good news, the cost of natural gas is predicted to remain low or even decrease in 2016, and 2016 is projected to be another mild winter. Natural gas is a commodity, openly traded on wholesale markets. This is why the cost of natural gas per CCF (volume of natural gas) on your MUD bill differs month-to-month depending on supply and demand. Electricity is also a commodity, but electricity providers are required to set fixed rate schedules for a given time period, usually per year. Changes to the rate schedule require approval by either the state public utility commission or publically elected board members.





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UNMC Ice Skating Rink Open until January 31
